Executive Summary

In coordination with the **California Energy Commission**, CSE is analyzing current residential HVAC compliance trends and Title 24, Part 6 compliance barriers in order to promote **effective HVAC permit streamlining strategies among Building Departments** in Southern California and develop a best practices guide for stakeholders.

This initiative seeks to streamline residential HVAC alterations by exploring and establishing best practices and that **achieve greater compliance across Southern California** jurisdictions!

To accomplish this goal, CSE is working with LA County, The Energy Network and San Diego Regional Energy Partnership to conduct energy policy analysis, local government engagement, compliance document verifications and convene industry stakeholders to cultivate a culture of change within the HVAC compliance market.

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HVAC Permit Compliance Project Approach

Goals

- (1) Ensure safe installation through energy code compliance
- (2) Remove barriers that cause contractors to bypass local permit and Title 24 compliance processes
- (3) Help building departments ensure compliance through implementation of permit process best practices
- (4) Improve regional energy efficiency by promoting permitted HVAC alterations
- (5) Create methods to track energy savings tied to HVAC change-outs to support climate action plans and GHG reduction goals

HVAC Permit Compliance Survey Design

Focus: residential HVAC compliance

 Mostly HVAC alterations but with consideration of electrical, plumbing and whole house upgrades.

Distributed March-April 2014

- 54 Southern California Building Departments
 - Selected jurisdictions with highest population
- 94 contractors, raters, and permit service providers

Questions based on responder job role and region

 Results identify compliance barriers specific to jurisdiction and HVAC stakeholder

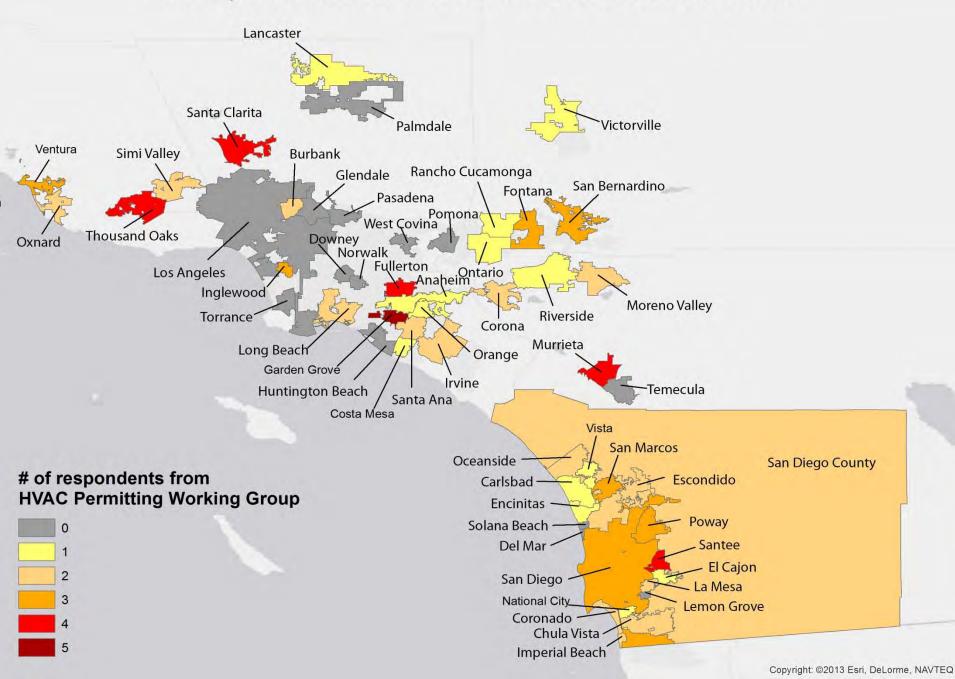

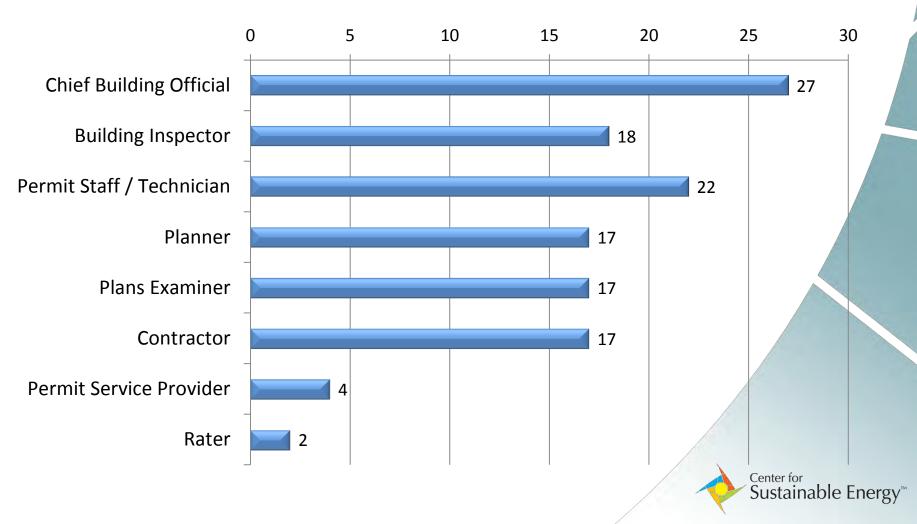


Surveyed Jurisdictions and Number of Responses

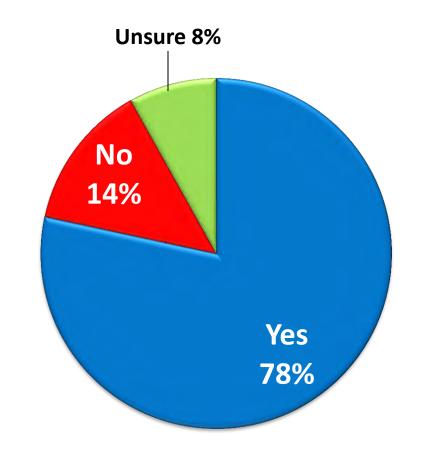

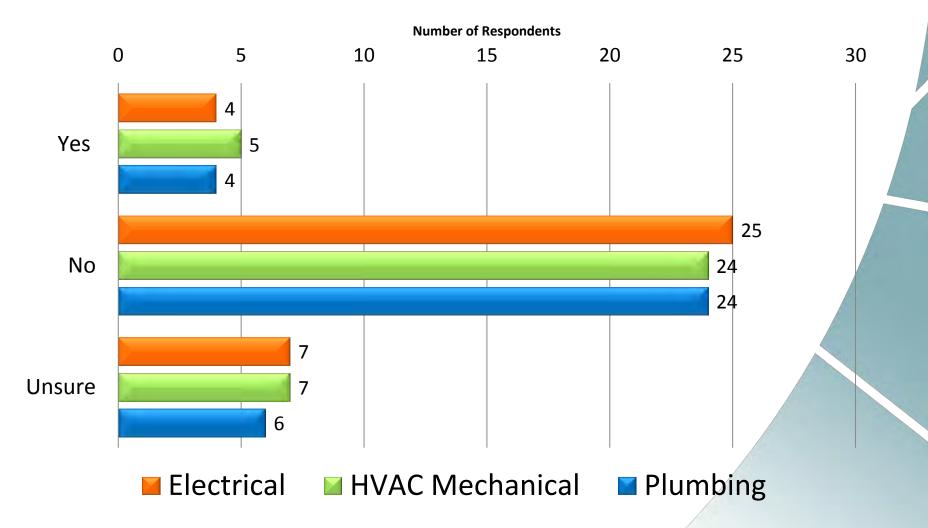

Do you feel your Building Department has adequate resources to <u>implement</u> Title 24, Part 6 requirements?

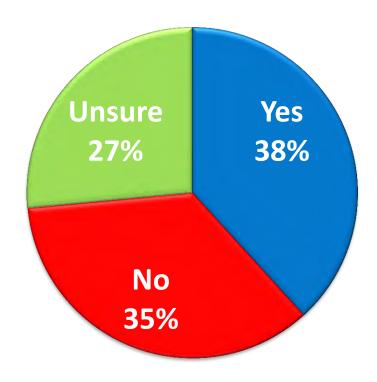


Does your staff need help implementing any of the following residential alterations permits?



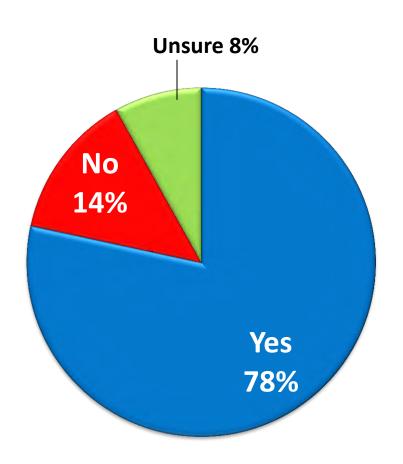


Does your Building Department have resources specifically for contractor <u>enforcement</u> of Title 24, Part 6 requirements?

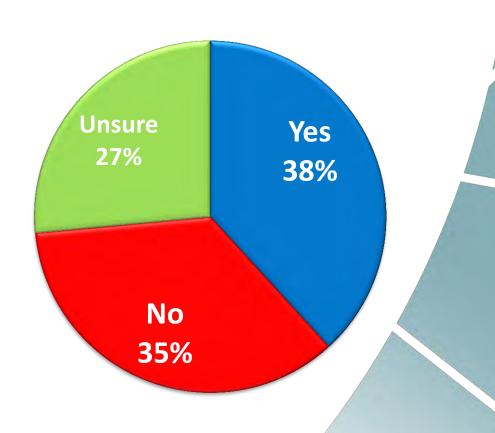

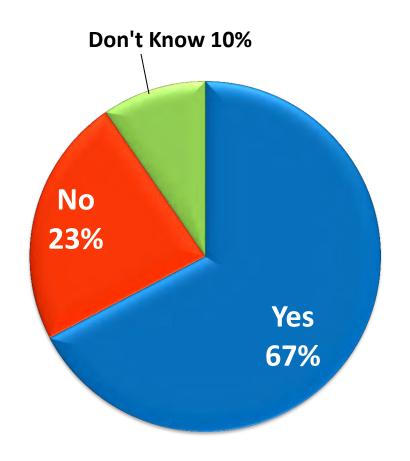

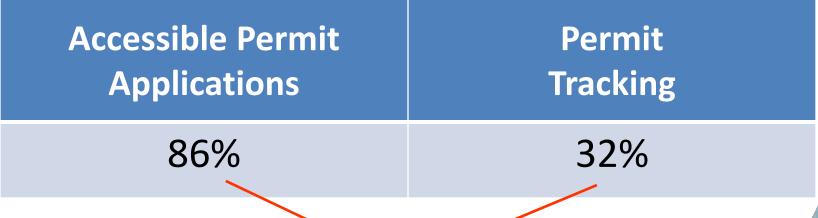

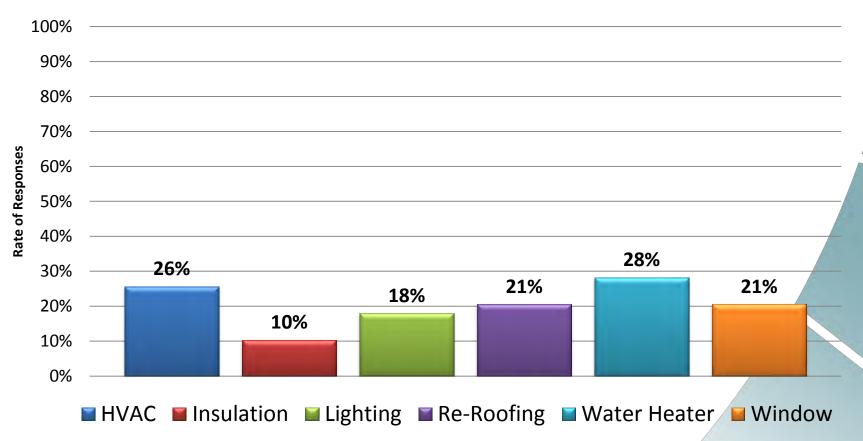

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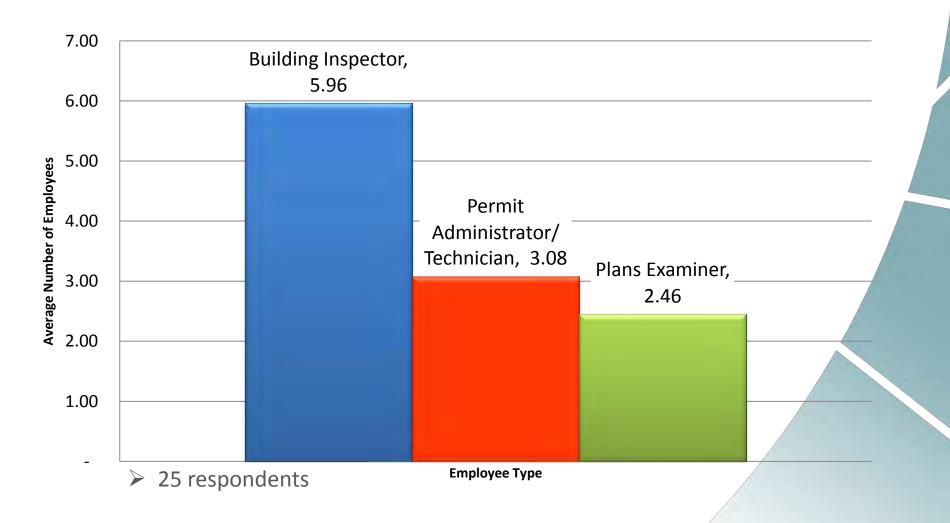
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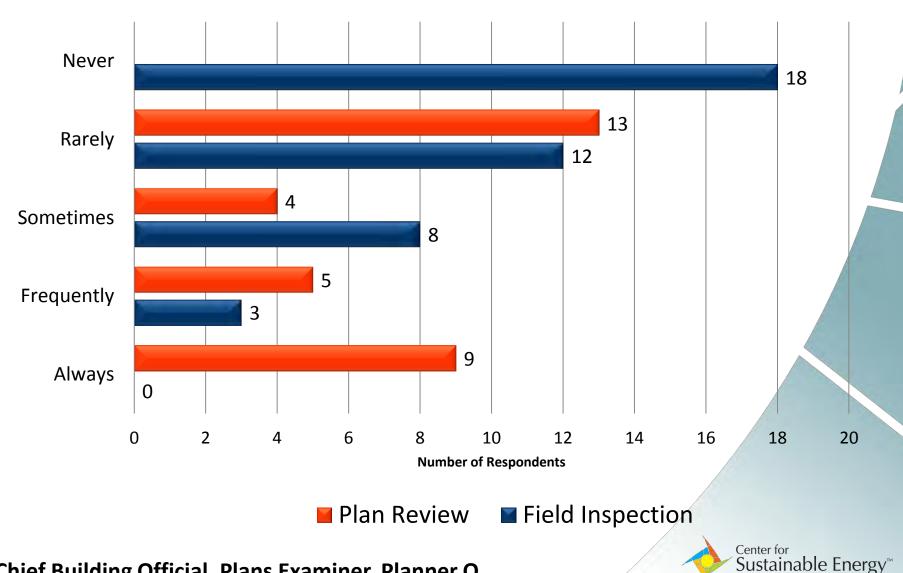


How many full-time equivalent employees does your Building Department have in each role?



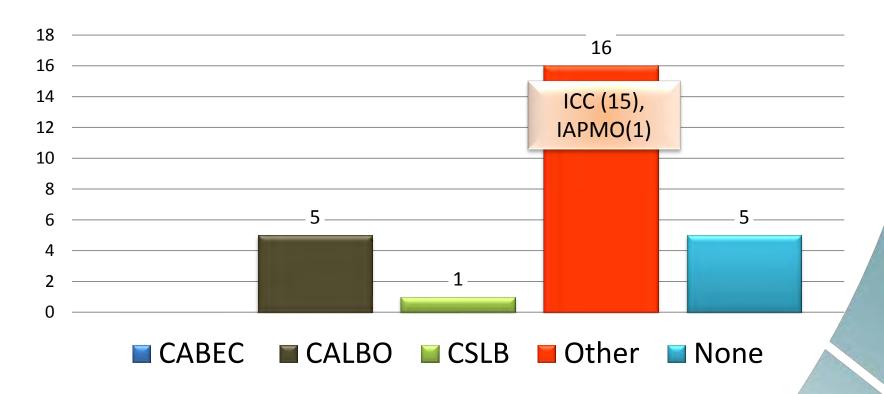


How often do you utilize contract services to conduct residential plan review & field inspections?

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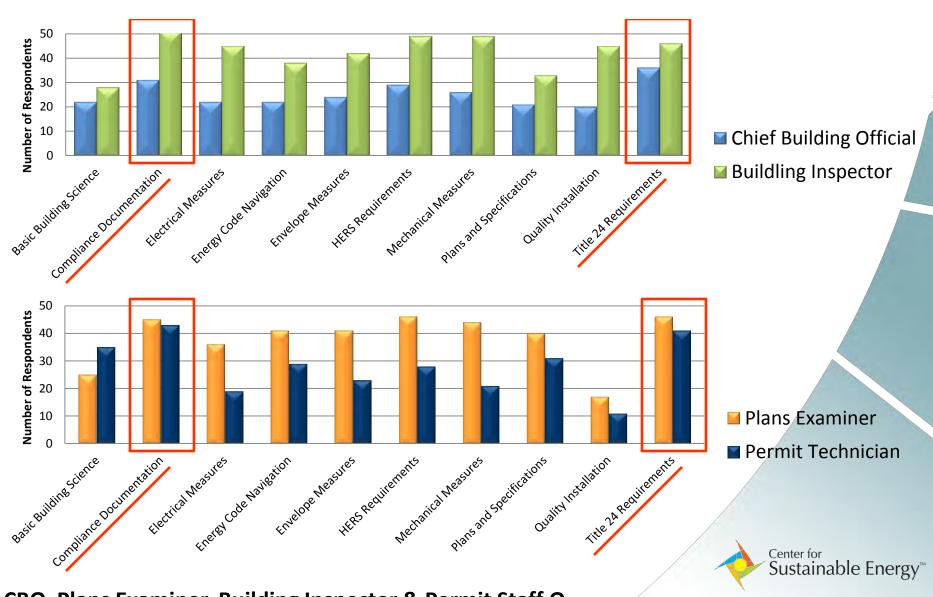


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What aspects of the residential energy code do Building Department staff need more training in?

BUILDING DEPARTMENT RESOURCES: Survey Takeaways

- Bldg. Depts. feel equipped to 'implement'Title 24, Part 6, but ill equipped to 'enforce'
 - What's the difference?
 - What additional staff would be helpful to enforce?
 - Would contracted inspectors satisfy this need?
- 82% of Bldg. Depts. offer permit process information online (including POC info)
 - This is where applicants go for information
 - Online info. reduces time spent by counter staff answering applicant questions
 - Who is responsible for maintaining this information?

- 86% of Bldg. Depts. make permit applications accessible online
- 32% of Bldg. Depts. have online permit tracking
- Bldg. Depts. feel that applicants need more education about the Energy Code and the permit process in general
 - Applicants indicate that they look to your websites for this education
 - What else can Bldg. Depts. do to help educate applicants?



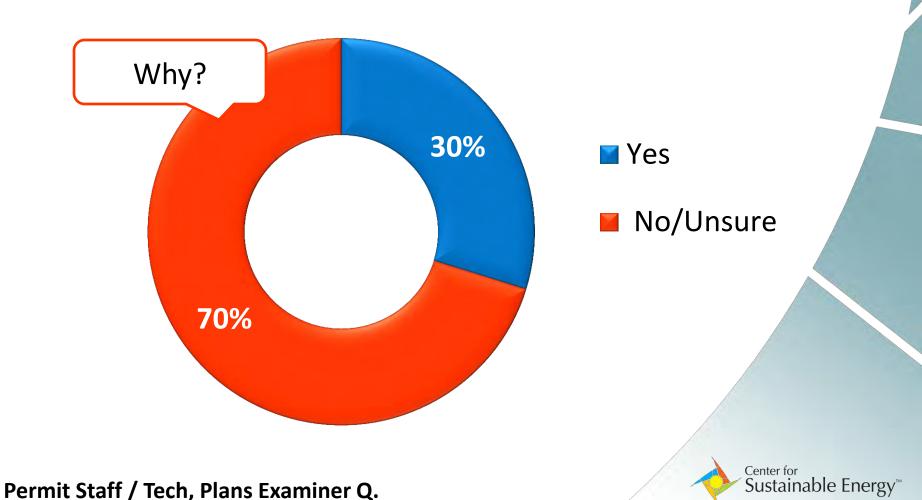

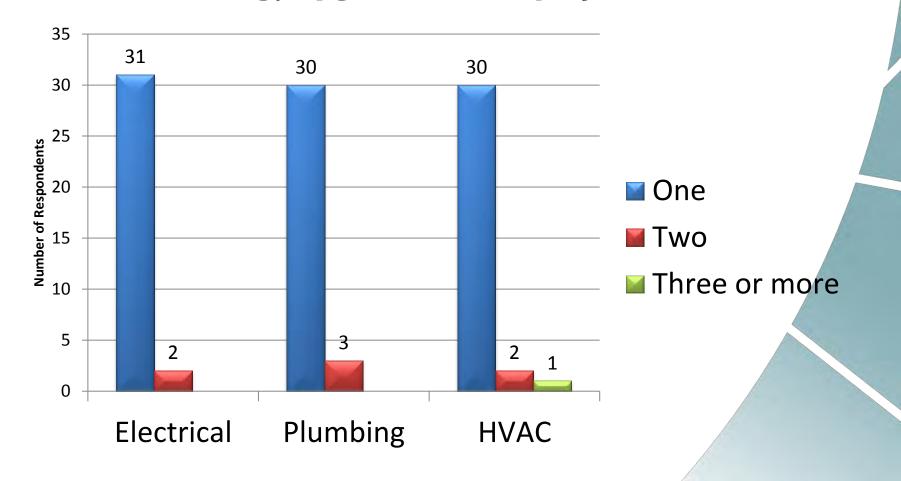

Do you use a checklist or reference tool to ensure the appropriate compliance documentation is provided with the permit application?

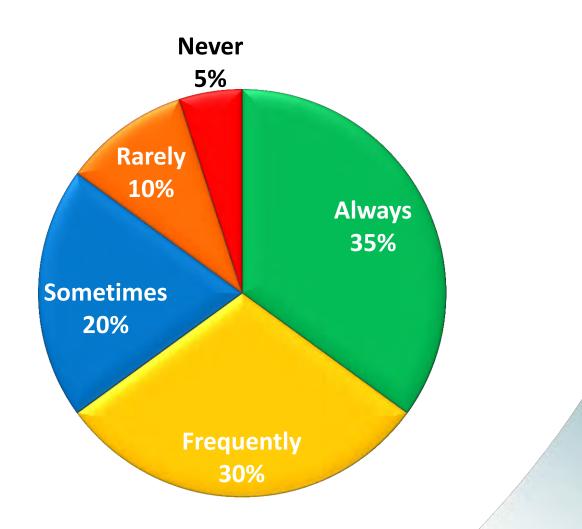


To how many department must a contractor or homeowner submit separate permit applications to for a energy upgrade/retrofit project?



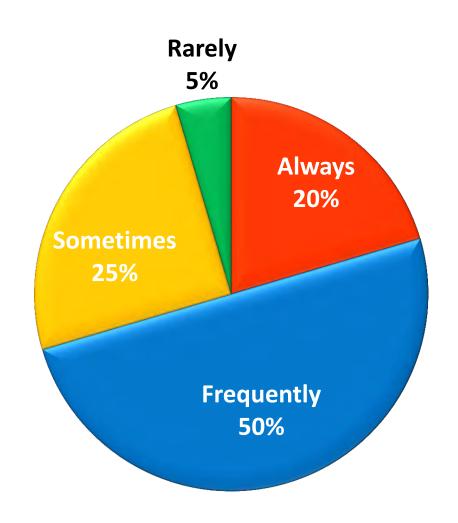


How often are Title 24 CF-1R-ALTs included with the initial permit application?



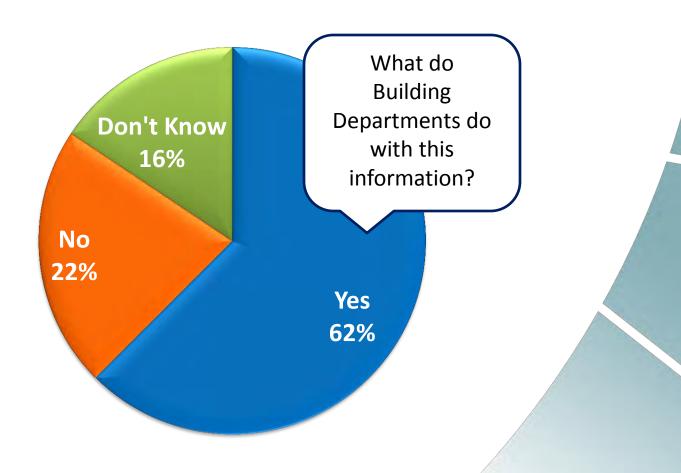


How often are permit applications not accepted or returned due to incomplete Title 24 compliance documentation?



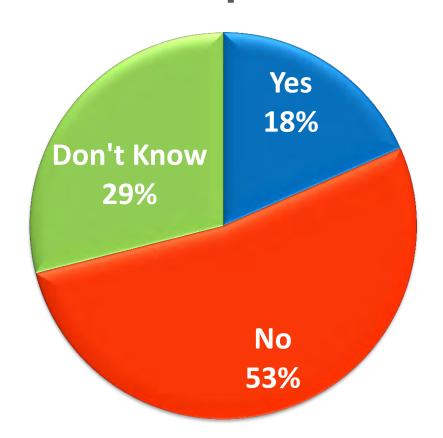


When HERS verification is required, do you check the Certificate of Compliance (CF-1R ALT) for the HERS registration number?



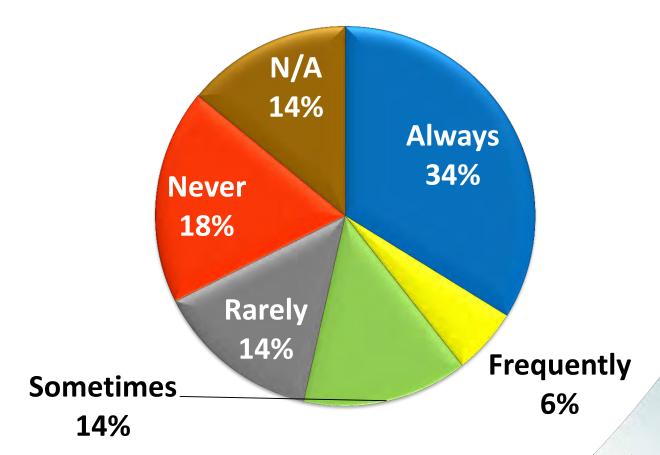

COMPLIANCE DOCUMENTATION: Survey Takeaways

- Majority of Bldg. Depts. do not use checklists during the permit review process.
 - Time-saver and Energy Code education opportunity for Building Department Staff.
- Applicants are in the habit of submitting Title 24 compliance documentation with permit applications.
 - Unfortunately they are returned 70-95% of the time due to incompleteness.
 - What tools are feasible to ensure complete submittal the first time?

- Compliance forms indicate that the HERS verification process is underway
 - Potential opportunity to take advantage of FV/DT services provided by HERS raters to meet some inspection needs
- Compliance forms are an opportunity to capture energy savings for jurisdictions.
 - Updated forms may be necessary for accurate energy savings tracking.



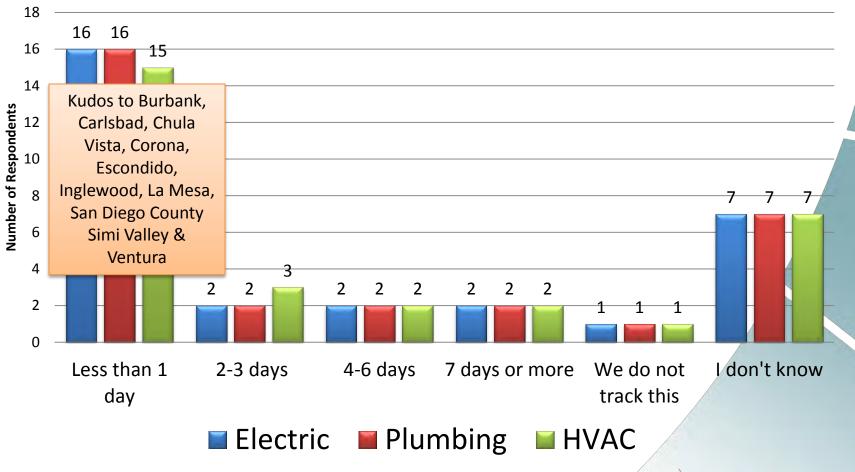

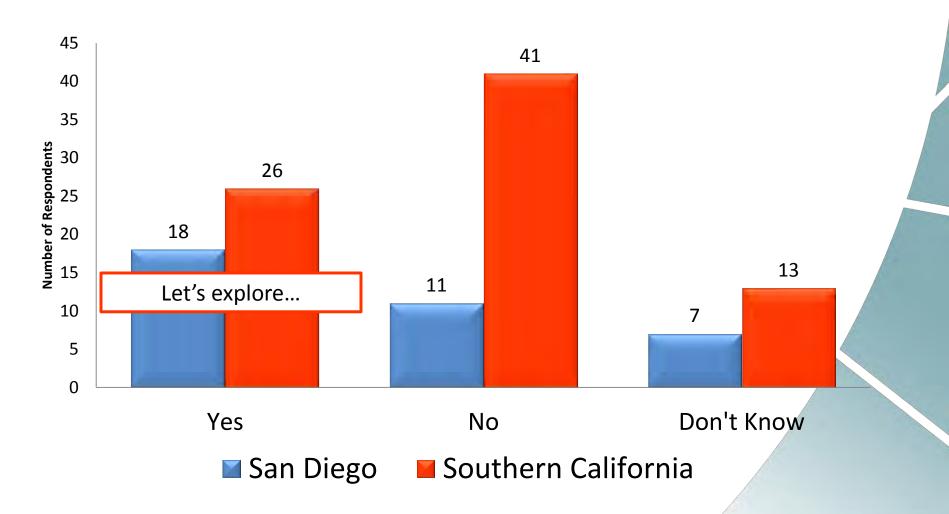

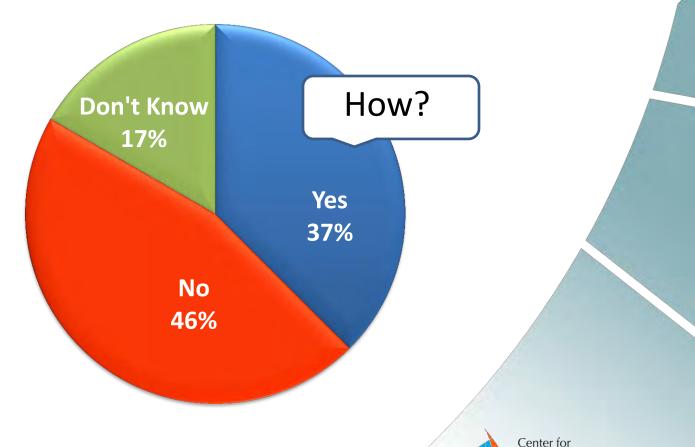

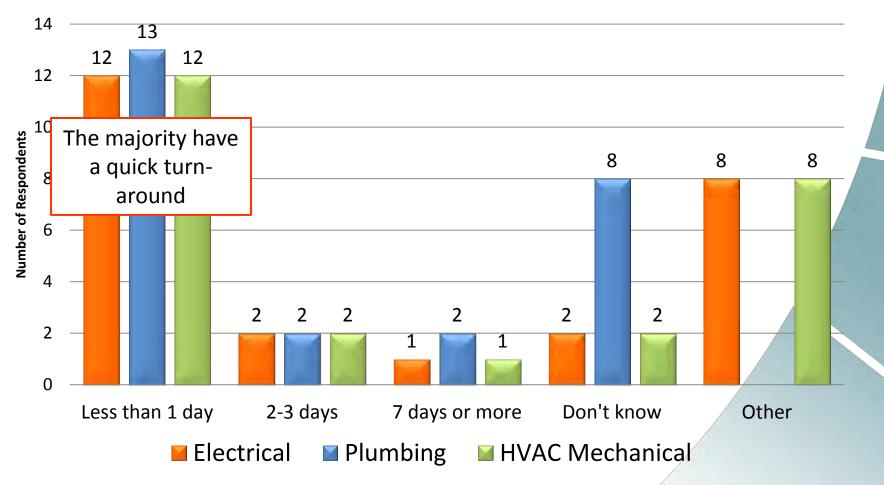

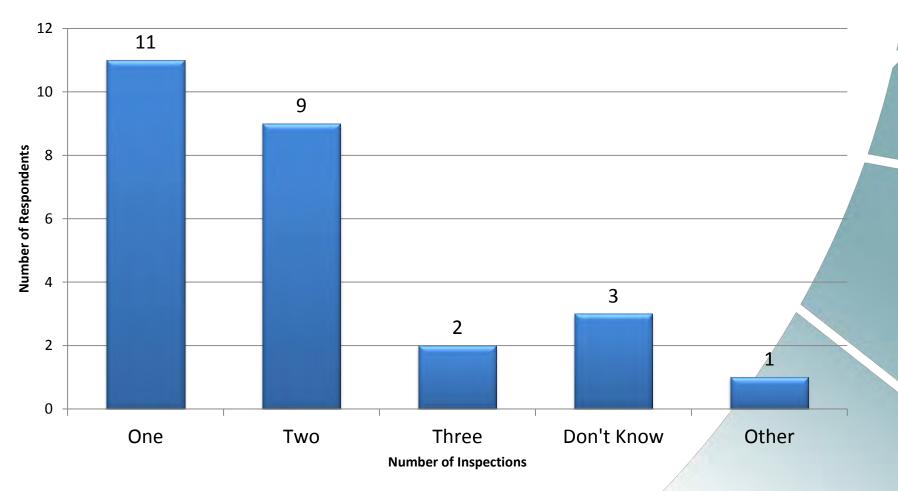
For a typical residential energy upgrade/retrofit, on average how many business days after the inspection request does the <u>inspection</u> take place?

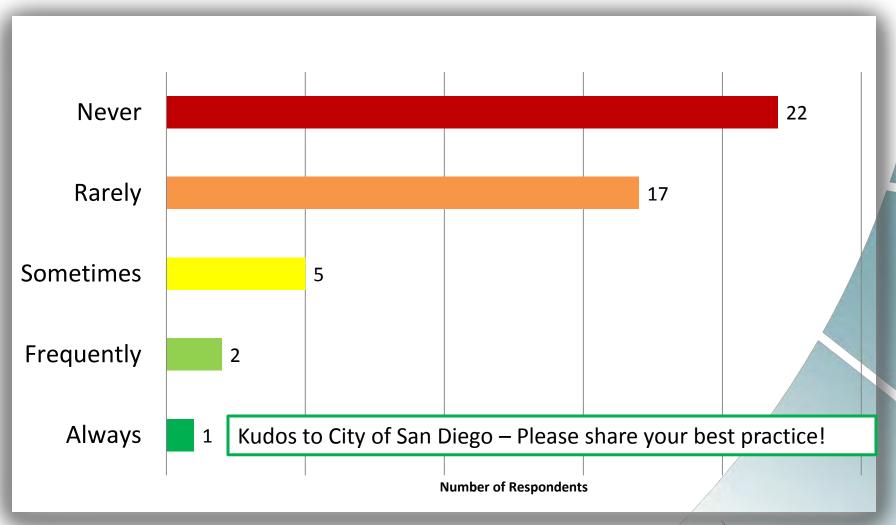
How many separate inspection trips are required for a typical residential energy upgrade/retrofit involving electrical, mechanical or plumbing measures?

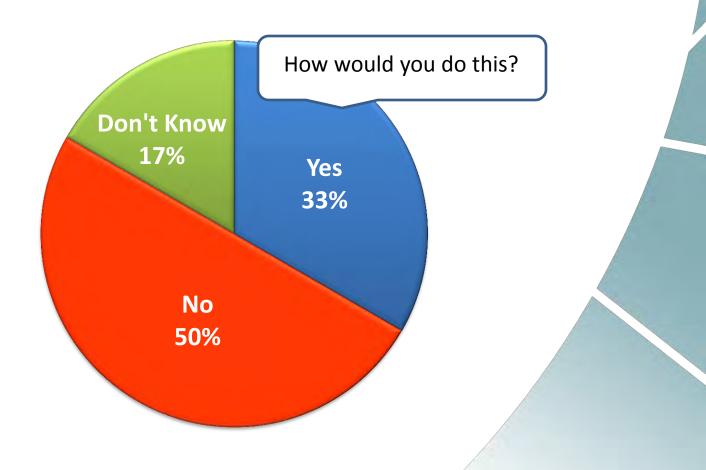
How often are Building Department & HERS Rater inspections coordinated?

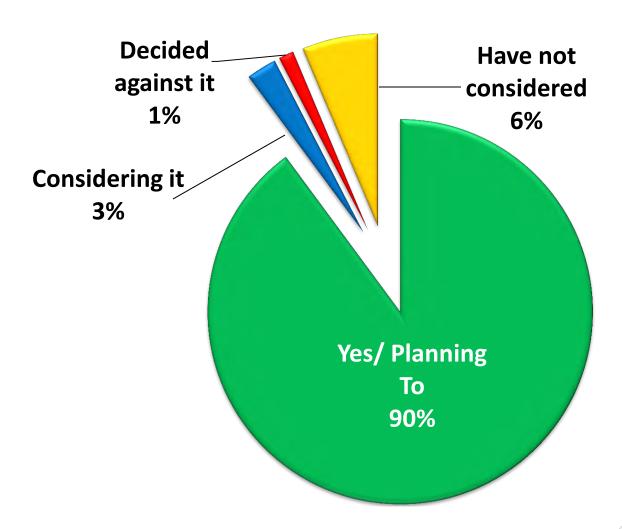

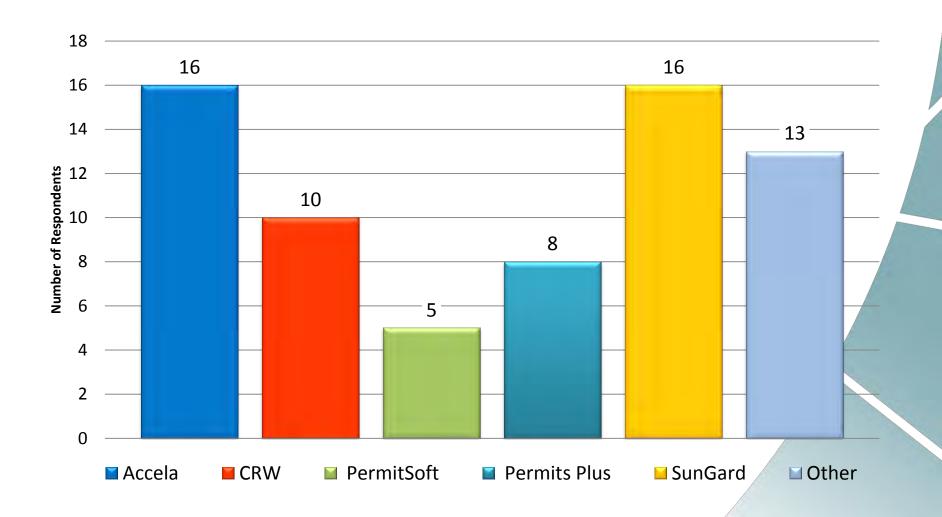
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Does your Building Department use an integrated software system to track permit activity?



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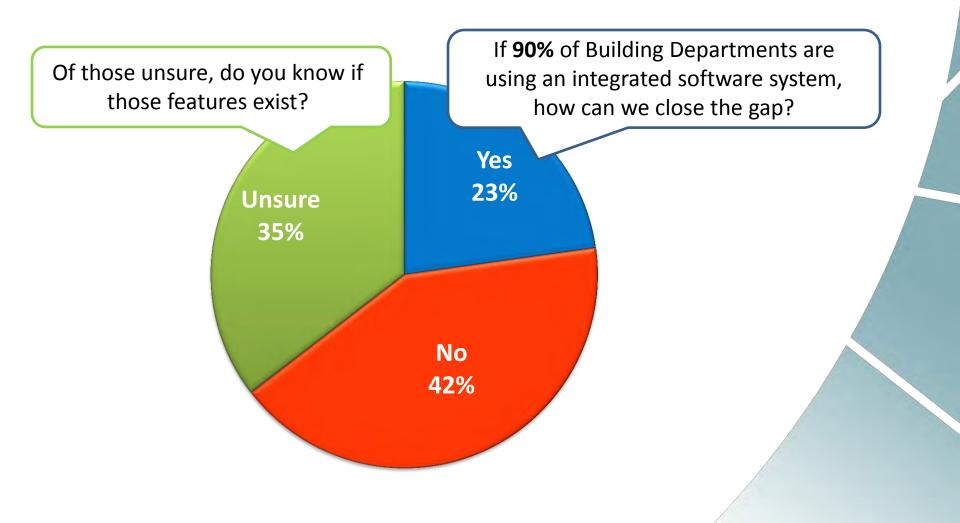
What software vendor are you currently using or considering?

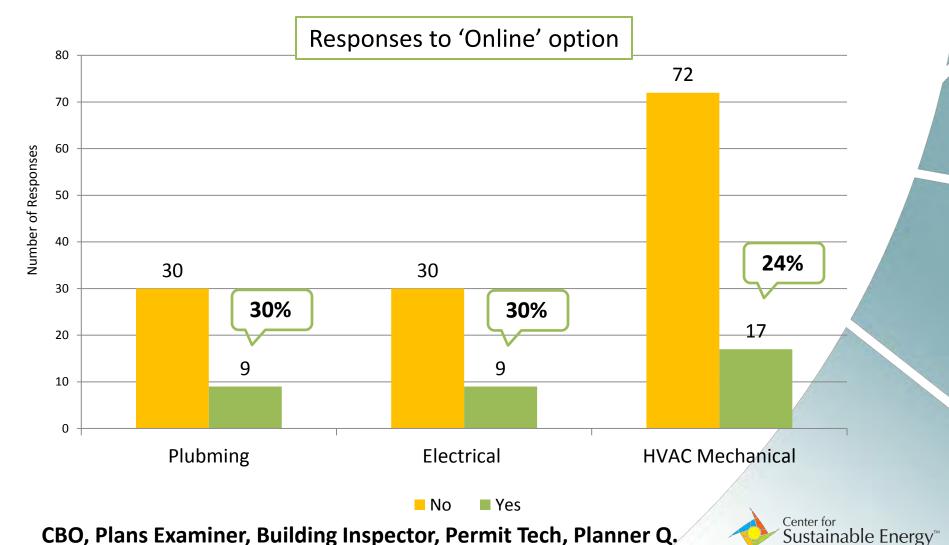
Does your integrated software system allow for inputting residential Title 24 measures?

PERMIT TRACKING: Survey Takeaways

- **33%** of Bldg. Depts. offer accelerated permitting.
 - Are applicants aware?
 - Would more consider offering?
- 37% of Bldg. Depts. are willing to consider altering the plan review process for projects that receive 3rd party QA/QC.
 - How would this work? What are the concerns and limitations?
- 33% of Bldg. Depts. are willing to consider forgoing field inspection for projects that receive 3rd party QA/QC.
 - How would this work? What are the concerns and limitations?

- **90%** of Bldg. Depts. are using or planning to use permit tracking software systems yet, on average...
- 32% of Bldg. Depts. provide online permit tracking, and....
- 28% of Bldg. Depts. accept permit applications online.

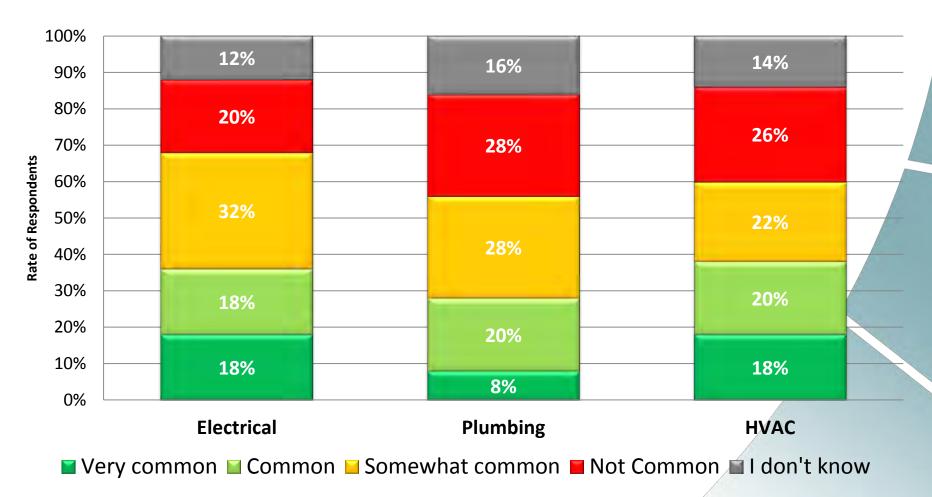

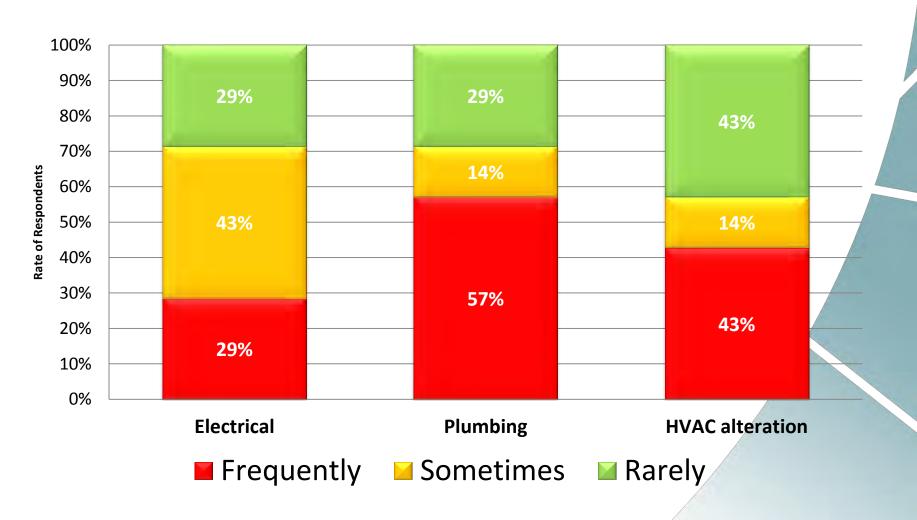


How frequently do you think permits <u>are</u> pulled when one is required for a residential energy upgrade/retrofit involving these measures?





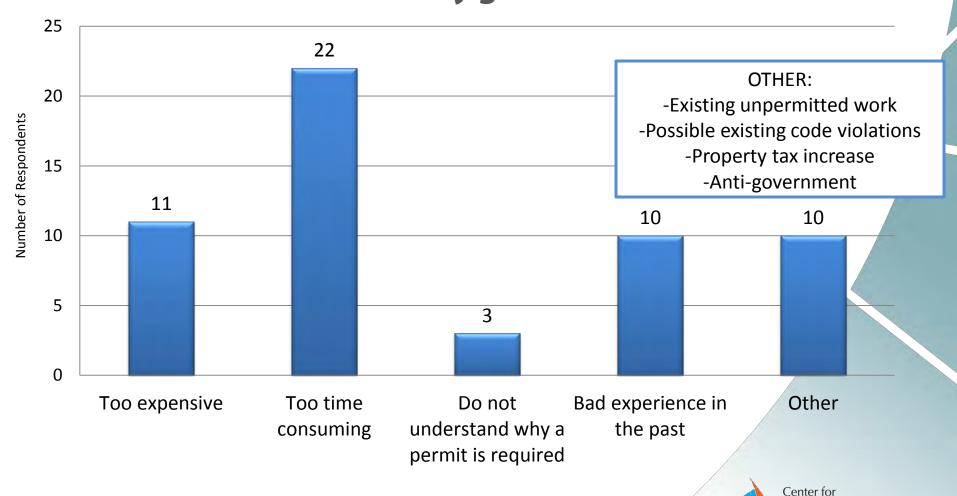
How often do homeowners request that you do <u>not</u> pull a permit?

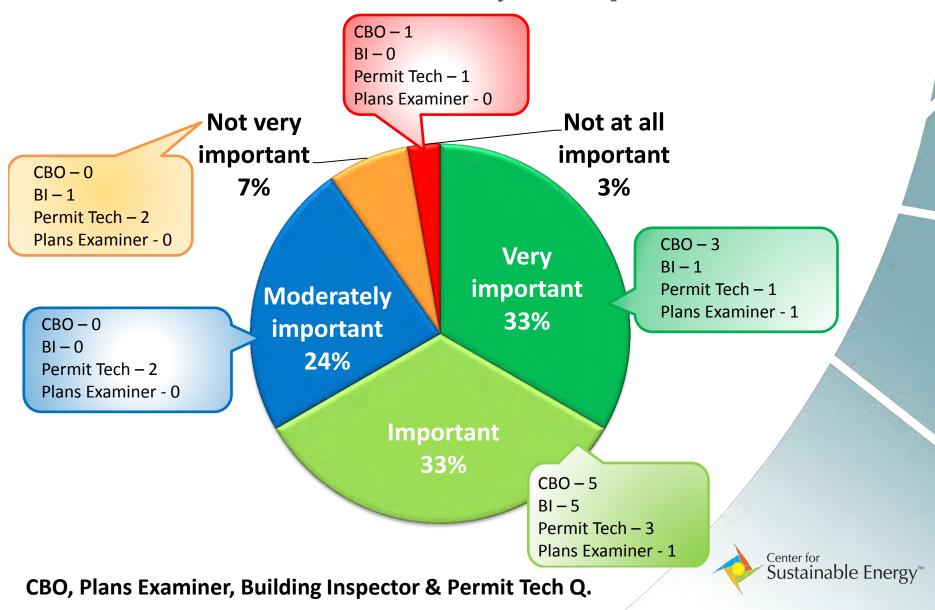
When homeowners request to not pull a permit for a energy upgrade/retrofit involving electrical, mechanical or plumbing measures, what reasons do they give?



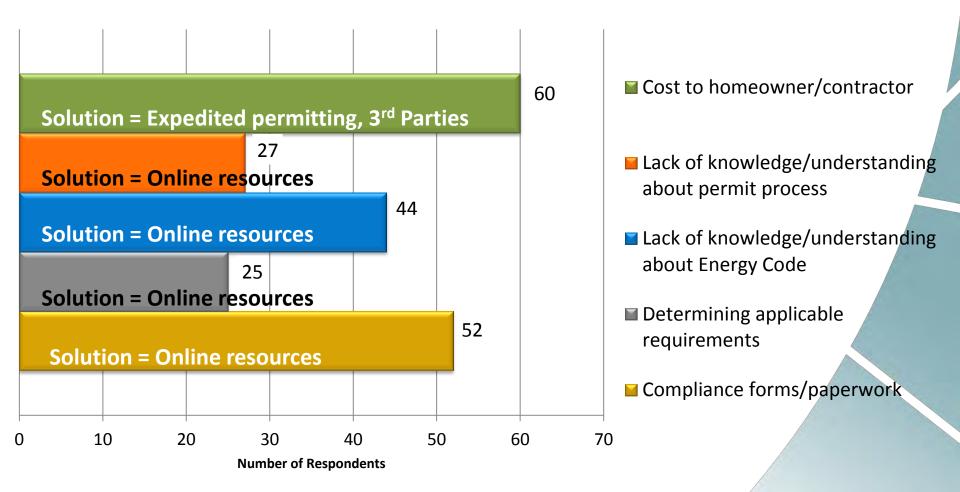

Next Steps

- Consider your ability to implement identified best practices
 - ✓ Increase the quantity and quality of code & permit information on your website
 - ✓ Use checklists during plan review and promote their use by applicants
 - Establish a functional expedited permit process for qualifying projects
 - ✓ Alter/minimize the plan check process for qualifying contractors and/or projects (e.g. Home Upgrade projects)

- ✓ Reduce inspection rates for qualifying contractors/projects (e.g. Home Upgrade projects)
- ✓ Use contracted inspectors for more projects
- ✓ Use HERS compliance documentation to serve more purposes
- ✓ Consider online permitting for specific projects
